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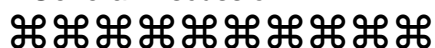
## ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

### Chairman's Report

Another year passes and the Annual Parish meeting is upon us again. This is your opportunity to come and hear what is happening in Chilton from our Councils (Parish, District and County), our School and Police. It is also a chance for you to question everyone and have your say, so please come along and tell us what you think of Chilton, good or bad, and how we can make it better.

As we have recently seen from the Vale of White Horse's Core Strategy plan, Chilton faces a future of change, some for the better, others may be more of a challenge. The proposed 275 new houses on the Chilton Field site behind the School still seem as far off as ever, but will I am sure eventually be built. The new joint venture at Harwell campus between Goodman International and UKAEA will lead to the

construction of new Science Projects both big and small bringing new jobs and opportunity. New houses planned in Didcot and Harwell will probably bring more traffic close to our village and possibly new roads. Much is uncertain but we can be sure the area around us will change forever. Fortunately the village is partly isolated as we have no major through road and building within the village, though inevitable, will be small. Chilton has seen change on a huge scale in the past, from a village of 50 or so houses and farms before 1960 to 300+ today, Harwell Campus growing from a wartime airfield to one of the nation's leading science facilities and the building of the A34 dual carriageway. All this demonstrates that major change is nothing new to Chilton and although things change Chilton, as the small happy community it is, stays much the same.

It was great in February to see so many people, young and old enjoying the snow on the recreation ground, sledging, making snowmen and igloos. It's rare to see the field so well used and it is with this in mind that we plan a sports weekend in July to get everyone out enjoying activities in the village hall and field - serious competitive sport for some and gentler activities for the less energetic. If you participate in a sport that you can easily demonstrate and allow others to safely 'have a go' at, please let us know as we want to turn this idea into a packed social weekend with us all trying new sports and competing in some more familiar ones. Let us hope the British weather is kind to us and the sun shines because I'm not quite sure how we can organise a family bike ride in the village hall!

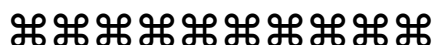


### Chilton Directory

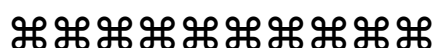

In April we held our annual Spring Sale which raised £390. Also in April a large group of us enjoyed a day at Denman, sampling some of the courses on offer including a cookery demonstration with members testing their culinary skills, and an interesting talk on the Ashmolean museum complemented by an excellent lunch. In December some of us enjoyed the 'Nutcracker' ballet at the new Cornerstone Arts Centre in Didcot and we hope to arrange more visits there in the coming year.

We are involved with village life wherever possible, and in May we took part in Chilton's Open Day promoting the WI as an excellent institution! We continue to maintain the village flower beds and in the summer we lent our support to the campaign to save the village bus service which has had a successful outcome - the WI is a force to be reckoned with! We continue to support the Oxford-based children's bereavement charity See-Saw and also supported the Christian Aid Plant Sale on 17<sup>th</sup> May by making cakes and donating other items for sale. Some of my fellow WI members sponsored me for the Christian Aid Walk in October which raised £50. ## Bellringing Report for 2008

We have tried to ring our village church bells for the Sunday service in All Saints' church every week during this past year. You may have noticed that some weeks we ring fewer than 6 bells. This is because some of the ringers are sick or perhaps have gone on holiday. If we had more members, we could ring for every service. Visitors are always welcome to the tower to see how we ring at 7.30pm on our practice evenings, the 2nd and 4th Thursday each month. Telephone the tower captain, Alec Samler, on (01235) 834589 to check that we will be ringing on the evening you wish to come.

Anyone tall enough to reach the bell ropes can try pulling on a rope. There is no upper age limit; you just need to be able to climb 12 steps up to the ringing chamber and to raise your arms above your head.

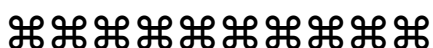
The Chilton PCC allows us to welcome visitors once a month at times which are advertised in the Chilton Chronicle. We can also have one peal a year. This takes about 3 hours to ring, other visitors ring for a shorter time.

We have held several 'Open Tower' afternoons to demonstrate how the bells are rung. These were usually on the days when cream teas were served in the church to raise funds for Helen and Douglas House.

We also ring the bells on other occasions. We rang for 3 weddings in the past year and already have one booked for 2010. We can also ring the bells for other special church functions on request. An old custom at funerals was to toll the tenor bell once for each year of the life of the deceased, but few people ask for this now.

Our bells were restored for the millennium; we rang in the New Year at midnight on 31st December 2000. Why not come along to start learning to ring and help us welcome in the New Year 2010 to celebrate 10 years of our restored bells?

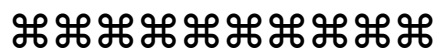
## Managing Diabetes

There is no charge for this open meeting but places may be limited. Please book places by ringing or leaving a message with your name and telephone number on 01235 750524.

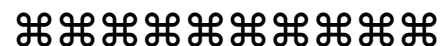


## Charity Quiz Night

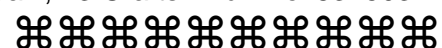

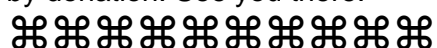


## Harwell Fun Club

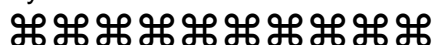

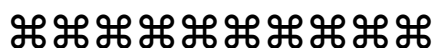

### Advance Notice

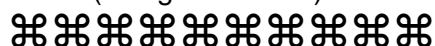

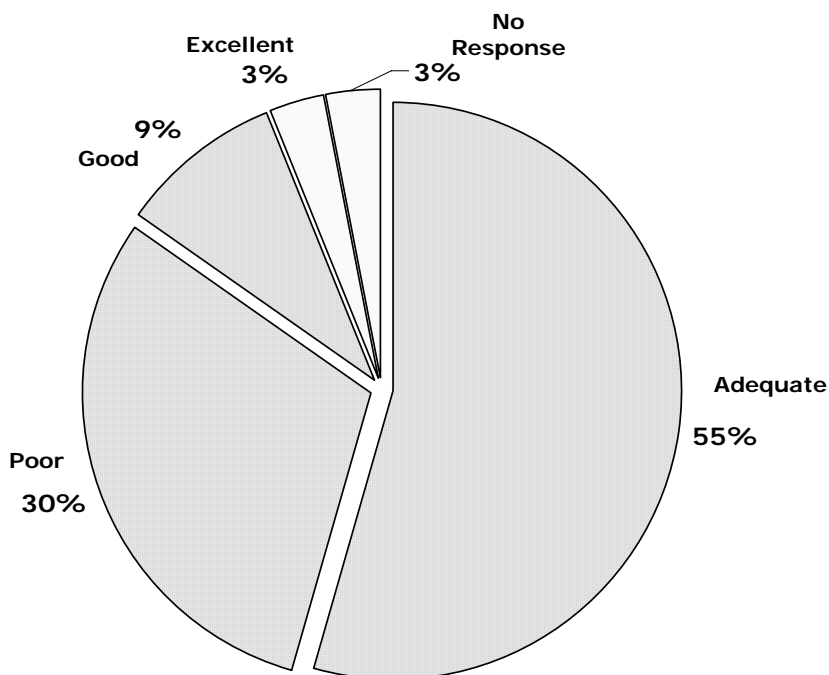

**Results of Survey on Chilton Play Ground**

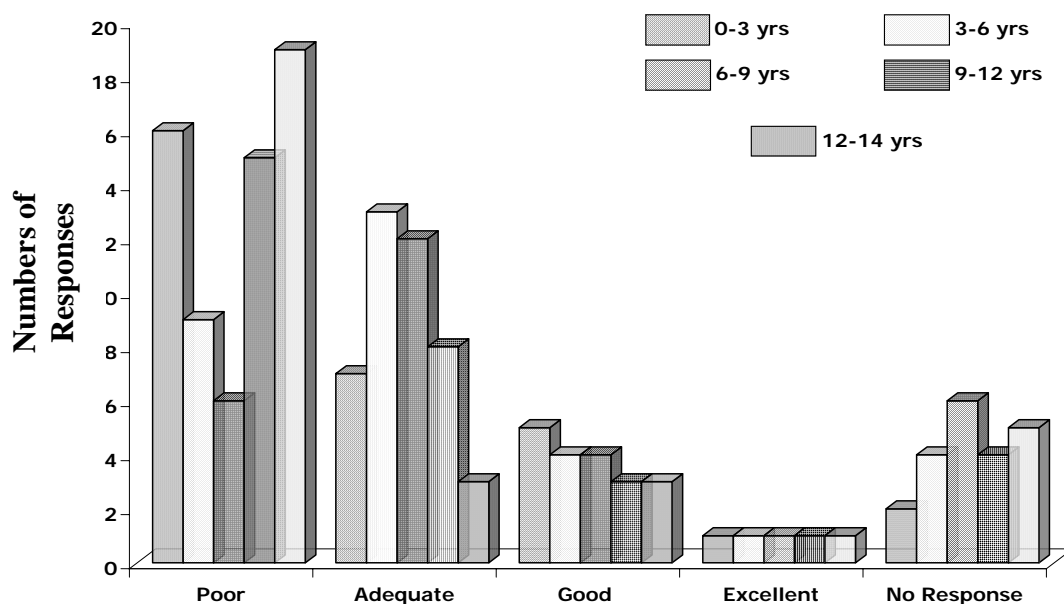
Many thanks to those who responded to the survey which was circulated in December 2008. 9% of the households replied to the questionnaire, the results of which are summarised in the following paragraphs and figures:

- The response to the questions “How do you find the playground at Chilton?” and “How do you grade the playground facilities for the children of various age groups?” is graphically presented in **Charts 1 & 2**. The results clearly suggest that there is a need for upgrading the existing facilities and that this upgrading needs to be concentrated for the lower (0-3 years old) and higher (9+ years old) age groups

- As a result of this survey on behalf of the Parish Council a grant application has been submitted to Oxfordshire County Council under the *Play Builder Scheme*. The outcome of this application will be circulated in the next Chilton Chronicle.
- I am grateful to the Chilton Primary School Head Teacher Mrs Dunsdon, her colleagues and the years 4-6 students for providing invaluable ideas and sketches on “*the changes they would like to make to the Play Ground at Chilton*”. Their support has been instrumental in submitting the grant application.
- It is hoped that a sub-committee named “*Play Space Management Committee*” will be in charge of planning and implementing any ideas that are brought forward by the children. This sub-committee will consist of the parents who communicated their interest at being actively involved in the management of this scheme and they will be contacted directly in due course.
- Finally, on behalf of my colleagues, I would like to thank everyone who responded to the questionnaire and am grateful to those individuals with never-ending enthusiasm and drive.
